Dear Child Care Professionals of Georgia:

May I be among the first to wish you a happy and prosperous new year! DECAL regularly uses some of our federal funding to make community impact grants directly to community organizations to address local issues and improve the lives of children and families in their communities. I am writing today because I think you may be interested in reading about the projects we funded in 2025. I am pleased to report that we awarded at least one grant in every region of the state.

Last year we introduced a new grant category, 2Gen Community Literacy grants (Literacy), to support the state-wide emphasis on improving literacy rates in Georgia. We continued to make Community Transformation grants and 2Gen Innovation Grants for Student Parent Success (2Gen Innovation).



We made four grants in the greater Atlanta area, **Region 1 North West**. The APEC Learning Center, which serves many South Fulton communities, received a 2Gen Innovation grant to create a resource hub to connect families to high-quality child care and career skills training. Black Child Development Institute-Atlanta received a Community Transformation grant to support and advance the careers of adults working in early care and learning in 13 counties. Georgia State University received a Community Transformation grant for a project to improve access to behavioral health services for families with children from birth to age 5 in Athens-Clarke County in **Region 6 North East**. Quality Care for Children received a Community Transformation grant to pilot a farm-to-ECE program to improve nutrition security.

In **Region 2, Central West**, we made a 2Gen Innovation Grant for Student Parent Success to Kennesaw State to expand its Student Parent Ambassador program by increasing outreach and recruitment.

In **Region 3, Central East**, we awarded two Literacy grants, to Scottdale Early Learning to create a 2Gen literacy program that includes take-home home kits and family literacy nights, and to the International Rescue Committee for a project in Scottdale to teach English to refugee families.

In **Region 4, South West**, we made a 2Gen Innovation grant Columbus to Technical College to expand a program for student parents in the field of early care and learning. We also awarded Community Transformation grants to both Brooks County Family Connection and Cook County Family Connection for projects to strengthen community support systems.


In **Region 5, South East**, we awarded the Coastal Plain Area Economic Opportunity Authority (EOA) a Literacy grant for a program designed to break the cycle of low literacy and help parents get the education and training they need to become more employable. We awarded the Valdosta Commission for Children & Youth a 2Gen Innovation grant to establish on-campus resource hubs for student parents at local technical colleges. And we awarded the Bulloch County Board of Education a Community Transformation grant for a collaborative project to improve literacy by means of a Book Bus, storytelling events, and professional development for teachers of children from birth to 5; and to strengthen families by providing resources on stress management, financial literacy, and healthy living.

In **Region 6, North East**, we made two grants to the Dalton Public Schools, a Literacy grant to furnish a mobile library and a 2Gen Innovation grant to establish a Parent Resource Center.

We received a lot of outstanding applications for these grant opportunities, and we had to make difficult choices. As always we used an objective scoring system, and each application was scored by multiple reviewers. I am very excited about all these projects, and I look forward to seeing the results.

Happy Helpings Georgia




